## The Pain It Names

The idea keeps returning, but it is still a note, a mood, or a private conviction. That hurts because the mind can feel rich while the calendar stays empty.

## The Real Solution

This file turns the idea into one rough artifact, one named obstacle, one if-then plan, and one 48-hour reality contact.

## Research Position

Built from mental contrasting, implementation intentions, and practical validation logic: optimism is useful only when it is forced to meet an obstacle and a next action.

## The Move

An idea is not ready because it feels bright. It is ready when it has a next object: a draft, a test, a call, a sketch, a product page, or a calendar block.

The Bureau move is to treat thought-space like a vault. You open it, remove one item, label it, and then force it into a smaller room where reality can argue back.

## Seven-Step Conjuring Routine

- Name the felt idea in one rough sentence.
- Write the buyer, reader, viewer, or user who would care.
- Convert the idea into one testable object.
- Write the obstacle before you write the plan.
- Make one if-then plan: if the obstacle appears, then this action happens.
- Ship a small version within 48 hours.
- Record what reality did: reply, click, silence, friction, cost, or surprise.

## Counterexample: The Idea That Should Stay Foggy

Some ideas die when you force them too early. Fiction worlds, brand atmospheres, research maps, and spiritual work can need incubation before they can be reduced to a checklist.

The exception works when the fog has a container. Keep a living note, one weekly review, and one rule for when the idea must become an artifact. Fog without a container becomes avoidance.

## The Less-Walked Path

The usual road says validate first. The side road says build the first ugly object to find the real question. This works when the cost is low and the idea cannot be understood from a survey.

Use the side road for taste-heavy work, novel offers, weird brands, and tools where the useful part appears only after your hands touch the material.

## First-Use Drill

1. Open this file beside one real problem.
2. Pick one worksheet or routine from the tools list.
3. Fill it with current facts, not future fantasy.
4. Run the counterexample section before acting.
5. Choose the next physical move: write, record, publish, call, invoice, review, delete, or wait.
